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What is it used for?

Calcium channel blockers lower high blood pressure and help treat angina. They open up blood vessels which lets blood flow easier down the coronary arteries, which supplies the heart muscle with its blood and oxygen.

How to take this drug

This medication must be taken regularly. If a dose is missed, only take the dose if you remember within three hours. If not, do not take the missed dose, and take the next dose when it is due normally. Do not take two doses at once.

Take this medication only as the directions say on the pharmacy label.

Before taking this medication it is important to tell your doctor if you:

- Are pregnant or plan to become pregnant
- Are breast feeding
- Eat grapefruit regularly
- Have had any allergies to other medications

Side Effects

Side effects occur in some people taking this medication. If they are troublesome to you, speak to your doctor or pharmacist.

- Swelling of the ankles, hands or feet
- Headache, dizziness
- Upset stomach or nausea
- Flushing
- Drowsiness/ tiredness
- Constipation (only with Verapamil)

It is very important to tell your doctor immediately if you have:

Slow, fast or uneven pulse rates
